

Student Lasallian Commencement Address

Good afternoon members of the board of trustees, Brother James, honored guests, faculty, staff, fellow graduates, parents, family and friends. So here we are. School's out for summer (or in this case, winter). School's out forever (at least for some of us.)

We survived the teenage wasteland of high school and, while some of our classmates said "we don't need no education," we chose to pursue a higher degree of learning and so we gather here today to celebrate the completion of that goal. We are the graduating class of 2010. How did we reach this point? How did we become Lewis University Flyers?

I'll be honest with you: I was all set to go to another university. I had visited the campus three times and had a cousin who graduated from there. I had the shirts and even the novelty blanket with the school name on it. Despite being comfortable with the school and enrolling there, my parents insisted on visiting one more place. Lewis University it was called. It was not far from home and an internet search also revealed that they had a fantastic radio and TV program, which was what I was looking for. We visited the campus and it was nice, but it didn't turn me against my current choice of school. Then I saw the radio and TV equipment and knew I had a difficult decision to make. It was fantastic equipment, comparable to what the professionals use. De La Salle believed in academic excellence, outstanding teachers, and practical, useful education. One of his convictions was that students should be given the best environment in which to learn and study. The broadcasting department here at Lewis definitely checks out, as does the nursing program, which just got a beautiful new

building. The aviation department has access to an airport and a new science center is currently under construction. The facilities, you've got to admit, are getting better, a little better, all the time.

Another one of De La Salle's beliefs was the importance of personal attention to students. Here at Lewis, this is most evident through the mission value of association: forming a community of mutual respect, collaboration, and service. These traits are present in the Lewis family. This is the family of faculty and staff that prepares students for life after graduation, backed with a solid degree and a plan for the future.
